Trish's previous productions for The Wimberley Players, include Dracula The Radio Play, War of the Worlds: The Panic Broadcast, It Had to Be You, Jacob Marley's Christmas Carol, and Romeo and Juliet. Her previous theatre work includes productions seen on Broadway, West End, London, National US tours, UK tours, Off-Broadway, and numerous regional theatres. She recently retired after serving as Managing Artistic Director for WP '21-'23. She served as Associate Director and Associate Producer as well as Costume Designer for the Peter Hall Company, under director Sir Peter Hall '03-'06. Her work in nonprofit leadership and academia includes Institutional Program Chair of Media Arts at The Arts Institute of Houston '16-'19, Executive Director of Houston Cinema Arts Society '10-'16, Director of Theatre for Rice University from '03-'07, and Associate Director '00-'02. She holds a BA in Fine Arts from University of St. Thomas, Houston, and an MFA in Theatre from University of Houston. She is also a Costume Design member of USA829.

From the Director

Welcome to our production of *A Streetcar Named Desire*. It has been an honor to be gifted with the opportunity to direct this play. It has long been on my bucket list. I would like to thank The Wimberley Players Board of Director's and Artistic Team for trusting me with this important American classic.

The cast, creative team, and stage managers have been a dream to work with and I thank them all for sharing their immense talent and hard work. This is not an easy play to produce and perform. Many of us have been affected personally by the issues the play explores. Each company member has given their all to get to the truth of Tennessee's words and I am grateful for everyone's bravery and strength.

I would also like to take this opportunity to especially thank our Scenic and Lighting Designer, Kevin Rigdon for joining me on this journey. His immense talent, 45 years of experience, and wisdom in all things of theatre are inspiring. I feel immensely blessed that Kevin and I have worked together on 33 productions as husband and wife for 25 years.

Since *Streetcar* premiered on Broadway in 1947 and won a Pulitzer Prize in 1948, there have been volumes written to analyze it. I have thoroughly enjoyed researching what Tennessee had to say on the subject in his letters, notebooks, journals, memoirs, essays, and interviews. Ask me questions, and I will talk for hours, but for now I will simply share with you Tennessee's own words in a letter of advice to its first director Elia Kazan. "There are no "good" or "bad" people. Some are a little better or a little worse, but all are activated more by misunderstanding than malice. A blindness to what is going on in each other's hearts. Nobody sees anybody truly but all through the flaws of their own egos. ... It is a thing [misunderstanding] not a person [Stanley] that destroys her [Blanche] in the end. In the end you should feel — "If only they had all known about each other."


